Underlying and unifying themes in this issue are those of engagement and participation. How does society foster an environment that encourages participation? How does the youth sector effectively elicit the involvement of the audience it seeks to support? How do we find safe means for young people to explore, experiment and discover their identities while participating in society?

'Social inclusion' is a popular term these days, most often used to describe the socioeconomic conditions that define levels of participation. Changes to policy are seen to be the means for exacting improvements to social inclusion.

Social and participatory media appear, at least on the surface, to provide inclusive and egalitarian communities where young people can experiment with participation. As is pointed out in one article, young people often create multiple identities to serve different purposes, even though they acknowledge that this can challenge their sense of self in both positive and negative ways. Cyberbullying threatens to further destabilise young people's sense of safety and desire to participate.

Australia, as a multicultural society, struggles to come to terms with how to bring immigrant into its communities. Two articles highlight the challenges involved in engaging immigrant youth. The reaction of their communities – online and real – has an impact on how immigrant youth choose to share information and express their identity.
